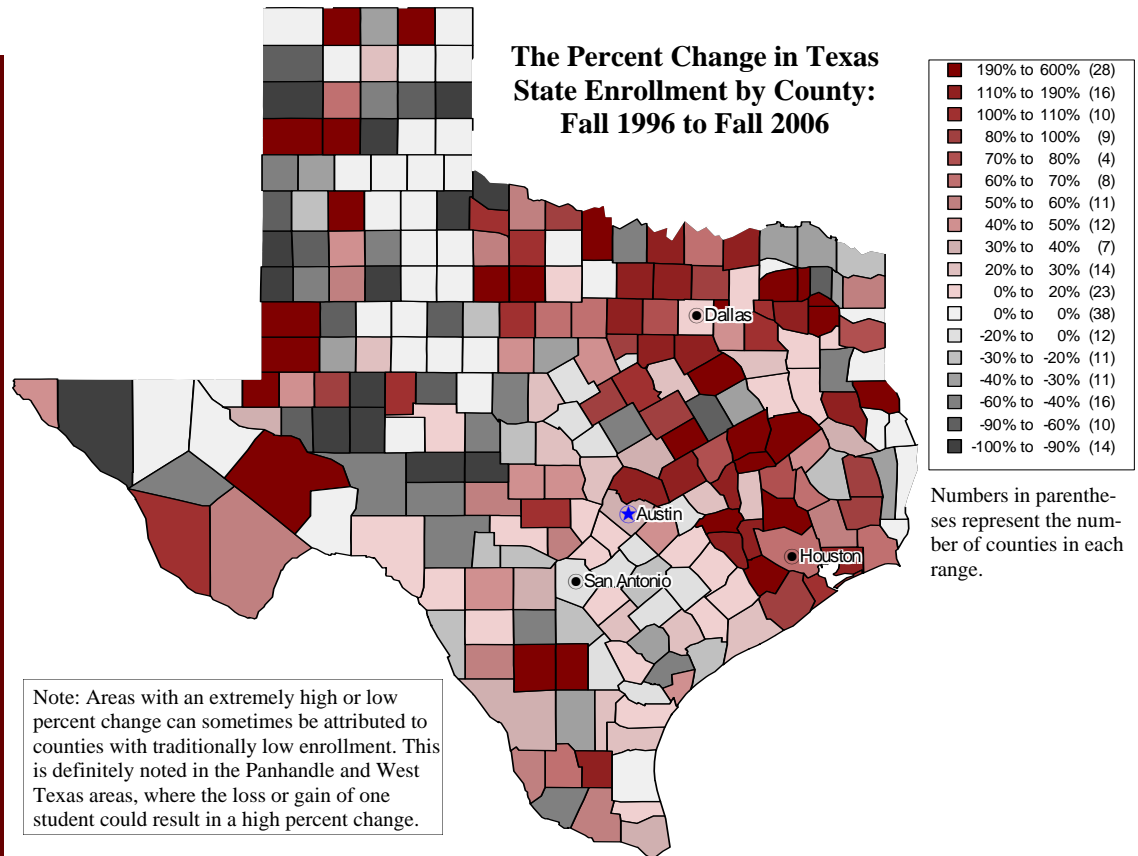

The Percent Change in Texas State Enrollment by County: Fall 1996 to Fall 2006



Note: Areas with an extremely high or low percent change can sometimes be attributed to counties with traditionally low enrollment. This is definitely noted in the Panhandle and West Texas areas, where the loss or gain of one student could result in a high percent change.

Numbers in parentheses represent the number of counties in each range.

This map represents the percent change in total enrollment by county of residence from fall 1996 to fall 2006. Areas shaded in maroon represent counties with an increase in enrollment, those shaded in grey represent a decrease, and the lightest shade represents no change.

As the map demonstrates, Texas State has had a significant increase in enrollment from the Houston area up through the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Enrollment in the Austin area continues to increase, while that in the San Antonio area has declined.

Fifteen counties with at least 50% enrollment growth and an increase of at least 50 students were selected. Of these, 53% (8) are in Houston and the surrounding counties: Washington 255% (51 students), Montgomery 231% (309 students), Fort Bend 196% (558 students), Brazos 137% (86 students), Galveston 101% (167 students), Brazoria 83% (160 students), Jefferson 68% (56 students), and Harris 61% (1,088 students). Four of the remaining counties are in the Dallas-Fort Worth area: Ellis 128% (59 students), Denton 124% (133 students), Collin 85% (194 students), and Tarrant 75% (275 students). Two counties are in the Round Rock area: Williamson 119% (936 students) and McLennan 87% (109 students). The final county, Hidalgo on the South Texas-Mexico border, shows a 55% (132 students) increase in enrollment. There were no counties with at least a 50% decrease in enrollment growth and a decrease of at least 50 students.

Currently drawing student from over 90% of Texas counties and showing substantial growth from Houston to Dallas-Fort Worth and in Southern counties, Texas State plays a vital role in Texas Higher Education.
